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In Case of Emergency

What would you do if you were away from home when an emergency struck with no way of telling people of any medical issues that might affect your treatment?

Armagh, Banbridge & Craigavon PCSP and the local PSNI have supported the provision of In Case of Emergency cards (I.C.E.) which provide detail on medical information including any conditions or allergies you may have, medication you are taking, your blood type and next of kin.

Chair of Armagh Banbridge & Craigavon PCSP, Cllr Joe Nelson said: "This is a very simple yet effective initiative - I think everyone should carry an I.C.E. Card. People don't think twice about wearing a seatbelt or cycling helmet, but if you had a serious accident you'd like your next of kin to know as soon as possible and you'd want the best care possible in a medical emergency."

At the launch, Chief Inspector Barney O'Connor said: "PSNI are fully supportive of this initiative which is straightforward, practical and user friendly and provides families reassurance that a loved one has personal information accessible in all emergency situations."

Emergency Services

In 2018, 850 accidental house fires resulted in 6 people losing their lives.

Through their 'STOP Fire' campaign, NIFRS want to continue to stress that even very basic fire safety measures can reduce the risk of fire:

- Fit Smoke alarms
- Test them every week
- Look out for Obvious dangers
- Plan your escape routes.

Aged 60 or older, with impaired mobility or a health condition that would affect their ability to acknowledge and respond to an emergency in the home is at higher risk from fire.

If you're concerned about your fire safety, or that of a family member or neighbour, visit the website for details. Firefighters will visit people in their homes to provide practical fire safety advice, develop fire escape plans and check and fit smoke alarms. If you have significant impaired mobility, they will also fit an additional smoke alarm in your bedroom.

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Taking the message from stage and screen

Totally Banjaxed

46 productions of the edgy play Banjaxed have now toured a range of venues from the Ulster Hall to youth clubs and secondary schools bringing a challenging message to young people across the community. The play, by Patricia Downey and performed by Spanner in the Works Theatre Company, was supported by the Department of Justice, Tackling Paramilitarism Programme and a range of PCSPs.

The message doesn't beat around the bush, focusing on risks faced by young people when they get involved with criminal gangs and paramilitaries and the effects so-called paramilitary-style attacks, drug taking and drug dealing have on families and communities.

The young audiences also had the chance to discuss their reactions to the messages in the play with representatives of the PSNI, Youth Justice Agency, PCSP representatives and Restorative Justice organisations.

One New Friend isn't always a good thing

How often do you question who you're talking to online?

Starring David Rawle (Moone Boy) and Ellie McKay, *One New Friend* is a compelling educational drama which according to its producer Elaine Forde seeks to "demonstrate the devastating consequences of cybercrime... while also focusing on means of preventing such offences in the future."

Teenagers from across Derry attended the film's premiere in The Playhouse, alongside representatives from the Policing Board, Youth Justice Agency, PSNI, DoJ, Education Authority and Derry & Strabane PCSP. Following the screening, there was a Q&A session led by Constable Liam Philips, a member of the PSNI's Neighbourhood Policing Team, where young people could discuss what they'd seen and learned, and how these issues affect them on a day-to-day basis.

Written by Aidan Largey and produced by The Playhouse Street Talk, the film was commissioned by the Youth Justice Agency and part-funded by Derry & Strabane PCSP.

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The Generation Game

Taking to the airwaves

Newry, Mourne & Down PCSP have hooked up with Kilkeel's Schomberg Society to produce an inter-generational radio programme.

Broadcast on FUSE FM Mourne, the project allowed a group of young people to undertake media, communications and good relations training. The radio broadcast debuted at the start of December and was replayed through the month, allowing thousands of listeners to get a new perspective on current affairs and issues in their district.

The PCSP and Schomberg Society (created to preserve and build the Ulster Scots community in Kilkeel) hope to run a second broadcast this summer.

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Focus on domestic abuse and violence

Domestic abuse crimes represented 15.6% of all police recorded crime between 1st October 2017 and 1st October 2018. PCSPs continue to support a variety of schemes and projects across the country to tackle issues in this area.

Training with Fermanagh PSNI

40 PSNI officers recently received OCN Level 2 qualifications in understanding domestic and sexual violence.

Training was delivered by Fermanagh Women's Aid to those who help to support victims and those who ensure that perpetrators are held accountable.

What are the current and emerging issues?

Within our district, reported incidents of anti-social behaviour have the greatest impact on residents and our PCSP is continuing to focus our energies on addressing these issues through partnership working.

We've seen scamming become more prevalent within the district, which especially worries our most vulnerable residents. We educate residents on the dangers of scamming, and how important it is to be careful with personal details.

We also prioritise working with partners on programmes that assist young people and their parents in making smarter decisions online and via social media, educating them on the dangers that exist.



What area is covered by the PCSP?

Newry, Mourne & Down PCSP covers the areas that were covered by the former Down District Council and Newry & Mourne District Council. We cover from Saintfield to Crossmaglen.

What delivery themes have been progressed?

Issue: Anti-social Behaviour

Action: We currently operate an anti-social behaviour sub-group, which oversees various activities that are being delivered in the name of the PCSP and through partnership work. The main activities centre on community safety action plans in areas identified as having high levels of anti-social behaviour by PSNI statistics.

Issue: Drugs and Alcohol

Action: We continue to work with partner agencies to address concerns around both of these areas. In September 2018 we installed our first RAPID bin, providing a facility for local people to dispose of unwanted prescription medication. We have plans to install a further 6 bins in the next 12-24 months.

Other areas

Action: We have seen progression across reducing fear of crime, rural crime, and hate crime, and through improving road safety awareness. Our delivery plan ensures we provide the most suitable support we can within our resources which includes supporting a very active Neighbourhood Watch Network and expanding our recently launched No Cold Calling Zones campaign.

What impacts have been achieved?

We continue to monitor and evaluate our work in each of the areas within which we operate through the completion of evaluation sheets and PCSP questionnaires by members of the local community. PSNI crime statistics are perhaps most useful to gauge the impact our programmes have on the communities we work with.

Success in reducing the fear of crime is hard to measure, but many Neighbourhood Watch Co-ordinators will give feedback on the reactions and opinions of local communities on a wide range of issues and it is through this forum that we can assess if particular initiatives are indeed having a positive impact in the district.

What are the priorities for the PCSP going forward?

- Internet safety & scamming
- Rural crime
- Anti-social behaviour

What initiatives are planned to deal with these?

Internet safety & scamming

Newry, Mourne & Down PCSP plans to continue to work in the areas of internet safety and scamming, and we hope to reduce the number of victims in our district. Key to this is working in partnership with all our stakeholders and continued support from central government, which allows our work to continue.

We'll also be continuing to utilise our Community Safety Wardens to reduce fear of crime and anti-social behaviour, especially in our town centres. Their presence provides reassurance and assists in ensuring we maintain a lively and safe night time economy.

Rural Crime

We'll be expanding our No Cold Calling Zones and Neighbourhood Watch, and hope that both of these schemes will help reduce rural crime.

Anti-social behaviour

Delivering focused local community safety action plans continues to be an effective method of addressing persistent anti-social behaviour and we hope to continue to operate these plans in the future in areas identified as having issues.

Bytes Project gets a makeover

The Detached Youth workers of Mid & East Antrim PCSP's Bytes Project have been given a makeover this month. Now they hit the streets in branded jackets, making it easier for both young people and the general public to identify them, and interact with their services.

- You must live in, or be able to demonstrate
 a close connection and active interest to,
 the Council area for which you are making an application;
- This is a voluntary role and does not attract any allowance.
 However, members are eligible to claim a general expenses payment;
- Full training will be provided to all members.
