The PSNI and Northern Ireland Policing Board are looking for your views to help shape the future of policing.

Their joint consultation is part of the Local Policing Review 2018 and will explore how police can best meet public need and demands and deliver the most effective local policing across Northern Ireland.

It is important that local communities have their say on what their policing priorities are and this is your chance to shape how things are delivered in the future.

Chief Constable George Hamilton said: **“Over the past 10 years crime has reduced however the complexity and type of work faced by local policing has changed.**

In addition to these changing demands, we have a reducing police budget and fewer police officers. We now have to consider how we can future-proof our service so that we can continue to deliver for our local communities.

“We cannot do this alone. Now, more than ever, we need to focus on building partnerships – working together with our public sector, voluntary and community colleagues and, most importantly, work with every individual member of our society.”

Chair of the Northern Ireland Policing Board, Anne Connolly added: **“It is important that the public have an opportunity to contribute to the discussion on the future delivery of their policing service and better understand the types of issues that the PSNI is facing in deciding where and how resources are used.**

We are asking for your response to three key questions and you will have the opportunity to share your views and ideas at local meetings in your area.”

Road Safety Reality Check

Antrim & Newtownabbey held a recent event designed to educate all road users; pedestrians, cyclists and drivers - on a range of road safety issues.

A shocking mock crash scenario showed the realities of how the PSNI, Northern Ireland Fire and Rescue Service and Ambulance Services respond to a real life collision. Young drivers also got the chance to take control of a car crash simulator to get a feel of the devastating consequences of driving irresponsibly and ending up in a car crash.

PCSP Chair Cllr Noreen McClelland said: **"Road safety was identified, for the first time, as one of the top 3 issues of concern in Antrim & Newtownabbey through public consultation. It is important the PCSP addresses these emerging issues, and the Road Safety Event was an excellent way to educate all road users - from pedestrians to motorcyclists - on road safety."**

Derry & Strabane PCSP's Safer Homes Scheme has meant that 1,250 homes in the area have been able to get free home security equipment over the past two years. The Scheme provides a range of security for around the home and most recently, delivered oil tank locks to Sion Mills Community Forum to distribute to residents in the community.

Tackling Domestic and Sexual Violence

Mid & East Antrim PCSP put the focus firmly on domestic and sexual abuse at its most recent public meeting, highlighting the support available to protect families across the district.

Speaking about the importance of the meeting, PCSP Chair Cllr Paul Sinclair said: **"Domestic and sexual violence is everybody's business and a 'whole of society' approach is required to stop it. MEA PCSP is proud to help tackle these issues that are rarely talked about in society and hope that if we even help one person from this meeting, it will have made a difference."**

Key speakers from Women's Aid, Onus Safe Place and Nexus NI highlighted the importance of working in partnership to protect individuals and their families who are experiencing this kind of abuse.

Speaking at the meeting Supt Darrin Jones said: **"The PSNI responds to a call relating to domestic or sexual violence every 18 minutes. However, despite this progress, it is still under reported. The PCSP will continue to make people aware of the support available in the hope we can help make a difference."**

Louise Green has been a member of Ards & North Down PCSP for almost six years. She is a community development project worker who wanted to become more involved in how decisions are made about community safety and get more experience of policing. She has worked on a number of community projects with various associations and has also volunteered across the district, so feels she had the skills and expertise to make a real contribution to the PCSP.

Challenges?

From a personal perspective, initially I found it a challenge understanding all the different terminology and reading and digesting the reports.

I think one of the key challenges is to encourage more engagement from the community on policing in the area particularly from younger voices. Another challenge is raising the profile and awareness of the PCSP, the work they do and issues they face.

How is the PCSP dealing with the challenges?

We are being more proactive in communicating what we are doing on social media and across other channels. We are also visiting more schools to raise awareness of the PCSP and to encourage more young people to get involved.

Achievements?

We have set up groups to look closer at specific areas of concern within the community.

We have also simplified policing reports which can sometimes be quite difficult to understand, so we've streamlined how the process works.

Personal highlights?

On a personal level, the opportunity to become a Vice Chair and also being part of a PCSP that is seeing a reduction in crime across the district. Specific campaigns that were highlights include the "Think before you buy" campaign and the Rapid Bin project, which helped remove prescription and illegal drugs from the community.

What is the benefit of the PCSP locally?

The PCSP allows local community members to be involved in policing the community. Also all funds allocated to the PCSP go directly into the community.

What delivery themes have been progressed?

Issue: Improve community safety

Action: Weekend and special event street patrols and the volunteer street warden schemes have helped deliver a 4.4% reduction in anti-social behaviour.

Action: Development of "Think before you buy" anti-drugs campaign

Action: Fear of crime workshops to over 500 people learning about scams and practical security

Action: Road safety roadshow to over 600 school pupils and regular deployment of speed indicator devices.

Issue: To support community confidence in policing

Action: We have delivered 5 projects to increase engagement between PSNI and the community. We have had fishing events, Airtastic days and Pizza with the Peelers in our 5 cared for children's homes to build up trust with this vulnerable group of young people.

The PCSP also provides support for 35 Neighbourhood Watch coordinators and we have set up a text alert scheme for those who may feel unsafe in their homes.

What are the priorities for the PCSP going forward?

Anti-social behaviour is the top concern as well as community and police engagement, road safety and tackling the effects of drugs and alcohol misuse. We are also focused on reducing crime in general.

What projects are planned to deal with these?

Drugs and alcohol

- A range of counselling projects to help tackle drugs and alcohol abuse.
- The introduction of RAPID drugs bins to help remove prescription and illegal drugs from the community.

Reduction in Crime

- Secure scheme delivery and rural crime equipment marking scheme. Support of domestic violence partnership and increased street warden patrols.

Road safety

- Roll out of roadshow to over 600 school pupils and regular deployment of speed indicator devices.

Community and police engagement

- Support of Neighbourhood Watch Schemes and local committees working with police to ensure engagement

Farm Safety Workshop

There’s no doubt that farming can be a dangerous occupation, the Farm Safety Partnership report there are over 100 injuries happening on farms each month.

Fermanagh & Omagh PCSP recently delivered a Farm Safety Workshop with the Camowen Farmers Group for a large number of farmers from across the area.

PCSP Chair Cllr Alan Rainey MBE explained: **“Farming continues to be one of the most dangerous occupations locally and it’s estimated that as many as 100 non-fatal injuries are occurring every month in Northern Ireland. The sad thing is however that all these accidents are preventable. The PCSP is keen to encourage initiatives which will help to make farms safer for farm families and for farm workers.”**
